

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We have squeezed a lot into the past two weeks. The Maker Experience with the Science Roadshow was awesome and the students created fabulous 'Marble Runs'. The students had a second go at creating these chain reactions yesterday and I have uploaded a couple of videos and pictures of these onto Seesaw. We also made our first Mangonels - these are very much a work in progress, some worked and others, well ...

Kāhu have been doing some hand sewing this week, they are each making a bookmark. We are part of the Winter Warmers programme again this year and the students are encouraged, on these cold, damp days, to curl up with a book and be transported into another place, possibly somewhere slightly warmer. A rotational symmetry art / maths activity created some stunning mandalas that now grace the walls of Kāhu. Fabulous fractions are our focus in Mathematics. The students wrote wonderful blurbs about our Term 1 read aloud, 'My Brother's War' by David Hill. This novel looks at the two sides of war - the soldier and the conscientious objector. We are connecting this text to another that delves deeply into the life of Archibald Baxter. We have been reading a lot about animals and how they are classified using Carl Linnaeus' system. Keep warm over the weekend, stay well and enjoy a few chapters of your book.

Wow, we have had some great experiences and fun times over the last two weeks. The highlight of last week was our Maker Experience with the Science Roadshow team. It was awesome - the thinking, strategising and testing that went on was amazing. It was interesting watching the children work together as a team and how they used the materials to create their marble runs. We have another follow-up day this week and the classroom looks a bit like an old amusement arcade with pinball tables. Last week we had our Te Reo Kori workshop and this week had our tournament in the hall. The Kahurangi NZ Maori Dance Theatre ran this, they were fantastic. It was very cool and I was so impressed with the way the children gave things a go. Very competitive and lots of cheering on of their classmates.

We will be sharing our experience from this at the Marae next week. Pïwakawaka will be teaching the other children the Whai, Koruru and Hei Tama Tu Tama. Well done Pïwakawaka.

Rheumatic Fever

Rheumatic fever is an autoimmune disease, which means there is a problem with the immune system – the cells and organs that protect the body against illnesses and infections. It happens when your child's immune system makes a mistake and attacks your child's heart instead of the germs from an illness.



Preventing Rheumatic Fever

While the symptoms of rheumatic fever may disappear on their own, the inflammation can cause rheumatic heart disease, where there is scarring of the heart valves.

Almost all cases of rheumatic fever, rheumatic heart disease and associated deaths are preventable.

Healthy Home

Recent changes to the Residential Tenancy act mean that by 1 July 2019 all rental properties must have ceiling and underfloor insulation meeting a set standard, where reasonably practicable.

Criteria for insulation funding

There are a limited number of grants for 50% of the cost - these are available on a first come first served basis if the rental property meets the following criteria;

- Rental property was built before the year 2000
- Named tenant has a Community Services Card
- Named tenant referred by the Ministry of Health's *Healthy Homes* programme Rental property is not owned by a Government agency


