Pet Day last week was another great day, thank you for your continued support for this event. In one of my meetings with the Ministry of Education earlier this year, it was suggested that one of the ways schools could lesson some stress on everyone was to do away with 'fluff'. Pet Day was considered to be fluff. So last Friday was important, not just for us to hold on to a semblance of our rural past, but also as a chance for us to come together informally as a community. I know the children enjoyed the activities and having their work judged, I'm sure the dogs enjoyed it and I know that our Judges did. They took their role very seriously, making sure they knew the success criteria before they started, and giving serious consideration to everything they judged. It allows us to have a connection with

Athletics Day

Athletics Day is next on our calendar and the classes have started working toward that. At the start of the term the teachers attended a refresher course on Athletics, organised by Sport Hawke's Bay, run by a representative from Athletics New Zealand. It was an opportunity for us to catch up on the latest thinking to do with best practice for teaching Athletic skills. One interesting path that Athletics NZ is taking is to do with teaching High Jump. Their preferred method for all children up to Year 8's is to learn to use the 'scissor kick' rather than the 'Frosbee Flop'. This is because they see it as safer for the children and that it is a more encouraging skill to learn for those that are not confident. So we have taken this on board and have that as a focus for high jump skills this year. Look out for it at our Athletics Day on November 17. More information will come out next week.

Swimming Pool

With the weather starting to warm up again the children are starting to have their eye on our pool. We are now waiting to have the concrete pad laid down so that our shed can go on it and the pumps and filters be installed. Then we can look at filling it and getting it ready for this season.

Classroom News


