

While reviewing our values will be part of the planning process, this term we are continuing our push to grow student understanding. Students who are caught showing our values are awarded Golden Tickets which go into an assembly draw and a major end of term draw. This term we are collating the Golden Tickets and students who receive 10 for one value will receive an embossed silicon Wristband. There are a number of students who are well on their way to their first!!







#### **Attendance**

Children who don't want to go to school can be challenging for parents. But, attendance is important, and as part of the Attendance and Strategy Engagement Ministry the Education has set targets for regular attendance. A student is regularly attending if they are at school for 90% or more days (9 of 10 over a fortnight). When this policy was developed only 60% of students met this target and it has dipped since then. The 2024 target is 70% and 2025 is 75%

We recognise that with the illnesses and events of the last few years, attendance has taken a hit. To put it into perspective, if a student was absent one day a week (80%), over a term that would be 10 days, over a year 40 days (one term!), and over four years this would equate to a year's lost learning!

As of this term, schools have more of an obligation to record and monitor unexplained absences and to identify learners who have been unjustifiably absent for five or more days in a term. From next year, there will also be more focus on the actions and interventions taken in these areas.

### **Gymnastics**

We're super excited to receive support from Sport Hawke's Bay through the Tū Manawa fund for a gym revival. This means that next term each class will get four one hour sessions with an Omni Gym instructor before visiting the Omni Gym in Napier (where the foam pit is always a highlight!!). Thanks to our keen gymnasts Stella, Cosmo, Cleodie and Emma for providing supporting letters and videos for our successful application.





The Girls' Self Defence Project provides courses run by the Women's Self Defence Network - Wāhine Toa and in the first two weeks of this term many of our kōtiro (girls) participated in a full day of training.

The girls learnt different ways of dealing with unsafe people and situations and threats to their safety, such as dealing with acquaintance and stranger attacks, being followed, and issues relating to cyber safety. This includes learning how to give clear boundaries and messages to those known and unknown to her when feeling unsafe, trusting her feelings and listening to her instincts. The course offers each girl the opportunity to take a positive step to reinforce their ability to think confidently, speak strongly, and use their physical skills when necessary.

- "I think this is a good way to teach self defence as it was fun and interesting."
- "This course made me more confident in defending myself. It was extremely fun to learn the difference of self-defence."
- "It was such a good course. We learnt a lot of things to keep us safe and it was really fun. I loved to do the crocodile roll and ballering kick."



## **Subject - Parents Cybersafety Evening**

### Attention all parents

We want our school to be a safe place.

Because of the rapidly changing times our tamariki are growing up in, and the mounting challenges and harms they are facing online, we need to start talking about and tackling this as a community.

As such, we have organised Author, Filmmaker and Speaker Rob Cope, producer of the documentary "Our Kids Online" to come and give what promises to be a humorous and eye-opening evening talk to our parent community.

### His talk will cover:

- **Cyberbullying** How cyberbullies can reach our kids 24/7
- Social media The pressure for kids to build an online brand that is often far removed from their authentic selves. FOMO, Highlight Reels
- Gaming and the developing brain An oversupply of dopamine leading to dopamine deficiency, synaptic pruning, and the underdevelopment of social skills and empathy
- Naked Selfies The pressure to send nudes from intermediate up through high school
- Online predators The methods they use, how to spot them, and how to get out from under their control if your child has been trapped
- Online porn vs healthy sexuality How consuming online pornography as a child or teen can create a sexual template where violence, aggression, and dominance are seen as normal and consent can become very blurry

- Challenging our own phone and device usage Reconnecting as a family


Here is a promotional video for you to watch Our Kids Online Parent Evening.

### To Parents and Caregivers

### POSSUM CONTROL

Rural Pest Services Ltd is going to carry out possum control in the following areas starting from the 1 July 2023 through to the 30 May 2024 on the following Rivers from the boundary fence or stop banks to near the river edges. This has been an ongoing operation in conjunction with the Hawke's Bay Regional Council since 2006.



WAIPAWA RIVER, MANGAONUKU STREAM, TUKITUKI RIVER, TUKIPO AND MAKARETU RIVERS, NGARURORO RIVER AND TUTAEKURI RIVER.

All toxic material will be dyed green/blue. Warning signs will be displayed at all access points into the operational area when work is in progress and will remain in place until toxin caution periods have expired. The following baits and poisons will be put in bait stations on trees and fence posts:

Pestoff (Brodifacoum) in cereal pellet

Double Tap (Cholecalciferol and Diphacinone) in cereal pellet (to be used in and around DOC areas)

Feratox (Potassium Cyanide) in pellets will be added to some of these bait stations in areas where permission has been granted by MOH.

This will be an ongoing process with the bait stations being refilled every 12 months with the above products. All baits are poisonous and are harmful to humans, especially young children. Do not allow children to wander unsupervised into the areas that have baits laid in them. Be vigilant especially if accompanied by young children. Because of the risk of poisoning from baits and carcasses, please keep dogs and other animals under control and do not allow them to wander into or near these areas.

We have been learning the very catchy songs of our production. Danny comes in on Fridays to help us with our singing and our exciting solos. Kāhu students have been busy learning their lines.




We had a couple of practice sessions in preparation for Onga Sevens. Wednesday was such a highlight for the class, even though the weather was bitter.
