#### **Principal's Ponderings**

Autumn is always a season of change, and it's my favourite time of the year. Over the last week or so, the government has heralded a number of significant changes and it has been interesting to listen to the rhetoric that has surrounded the announcements. As always there are valid points on both sides of the divide.

Like many other schools, Structured Literacy, is something we implemented ourselves, starting our journey two and a half years ago. We're pretty fortunate to have in-school expertise with Heidi leading the roll out and our teaching team quickly becoming more than competent practitioners. That being said, we have had to fund this initiative ourselves from our operational budget so it will be fantastic to now be able to get funding for professional learning and resources such as decodable texts.

Within our literacy programme, explicit reading and writing occurs, complemented by structured literacy, to ensure that there is balance and the needs of all our learners are met.

Recently, there was a call from the NZ Principals' Federation to the government outlining the concern from members around the country about the pace of change and a perceived lack of consultation. I would support this call. Changes have been coming thick and fast in education for some time with very little support and what would appear to be an unawareness of the bigger picture. Often there are many bodies of work under way in Ministry silos that operate separately from each other. As such, often there are multiple projects that are expected to be implemented simultaneously which can be overwhelming. I believe that this is in part to the politicisation of education with successive governments each trying to align education with their agenda. Long term, we would be better served by an education system outside of politics underpinned by long term, evidenced based strategy and curriculum.

#### Doing the Hard Easy

When I was on Outward Bound, one of our morning lessons was around **THE HARD EASY!** To illustrate this concept they shared an anecdote:

"My room-mate owns a row-boat which he parks in our driveway. When he uses it, he unearths it from a giant nylon tarp, but when he returns, the tarp inevitably remains heaped next to the boat, unapplied. Once, I watched as he walked to the window, listening as heavy rain started to fall. He looked at his boat. This was his moment, and he let it pass.

A week later, I watched as he looked in horror at his boat, filled to the gunwales with rainwater. He had to bail it out by hand, a task requiring many hours. Had he instead done **the Hard Easy**, accepting the discomfort of the rain, the tarp would have saved him a lot of sweat off his back."



The concept of the Hard Easy is simple to understand: There are simple yet absolutely crucial tasks throughout our daily life that if tackled will make our lives exponentially easier down the road. Yet, as is the way of things, it is incredibly hard to get ourselves to do them. Doing the Hard Easy means recognizing these moments for what they are and simply doing what needs to be done, even though we don't want to (mountainlessons.com).

#### A small segue

Whether raising or teaching children, doing the hard easy is hugely important, not just for that moment but further down the track.

#### Hard Easy Segue continued...

The hard easy is especially relevant when dealing with behaviour. While there is a case for ignoring some behaviour when it's happening, especially attention seeking behaviour, it is important to view these moments as learning opportunities. Discussing what happened and why, along with identifying strategies so that it doesn't happen again are important steps in the process to help children improve their self-regulation skills.

This can be hard work. It can be draining, and sometimes it can feel frustrating. It would be far easier to ignore. However, this is a short term fix, and it's important to remember that the behaviour you walk past (or ignore) is the behaviour you accept. It becomes the norm, initially, and then it escalates.

At school, our values underpin all that we do and they form the expectations for student behaviour. We constantly reinforce our values through praise and recognition for students who show our values. We explicitly teach and model them in class. But, we also deal with poor choices, holding restorative chats or conferences and ensuring there are consequences when needed. At times it can feel hard. At times teachers feel like it would be far easier to walk past. But we don't. We care for our students and one of the ways **we show that we care is by doing the hard easy!**

is about relationships, aroha and a sense of connection. It is created through shared experiences and working together to create a sense of belonging.

# Manaakitanga

is about empathy, kindness and respect. It is about generosity and a desire to uplift others.

# Oranga Hauora

is about healthy living and lifestyles. It's about making healthy living choices that enhance our health and wellbeing to benefit our learners and our community.

# Tangata Whenuatanga

is about place based education, cultural awareness and knowledge of the whenua. It is about affirming M  $_{\bar{a}}$  ori learners and providing authentic contexts for learning.

# Technology

Each week our Year 7-8's attend the Technology Centre based at Waipawa School. Below is an overview of the term focus and reports on their progress. It's awesome to see our students embracing these opportunities!

# KAUMATUA - UNIT TWO OVERVIEW

## Horopaki Learning Context:

Older folk in our community have confronted many challenges over the course of their lives. Our students are to consider how they can support the elderly so they can assist to make a difference in their lives.

Kaumatua are often used to an independent life in their own homes. Sometimes they find themselves adjusting to shared living as in Care Homes. Maybe they now find themselves living alone. These changes in lifestyles often require adjustments. One hobby many of us have is music, but one person's favourite song can be another's nightmare. A technological solution is the speaker pillow. We will investigate the benefits and pitfalls of such technology and design options for the pillow. Students will be budgeting, planning and executing their design, whilst learning valuable sewing skills and following a pattern.

**30th April** - A fantastic first day. They got on really well, shared machines and completed the work. We talked about Kaumatua and what we can do to help them through a stay in hospital. We looked at the speaker pillow and started learning about or refreshing ourselves about the sewing machine. Callyn worked really well, Skye and Addison made a great team. Jayce and Regan showed awesome initiative.

**7th May** - Another fabulous session. We sewed our cushion inserts, discussed specifications and physical attributes. Callyn worked hard, and Mckenzie gave it a go. Sophie, Imogen, Lucy and Addision all worked really well, showing great problem solving and initiative.



- When the reading book I choose seems a bit hard, take turns reading it with me and talking about the story - for example, ask me things like: What do you think will happen next? Do the characters remind you of anyone you know?
- When I read to you, use the Pause, Prompt, Praise strategy When I stop at a difficult word, remind me to pause and give me about five seconds to think. If I can't figure out the word on my own, prompt me by reminding me to use one of the strategies my teacher has taught me. If I don't know the word after I have tried it twice, tell me what the word is When I try hard praise me, tell me something good you noticed.




# What's happening in Kea Class in Term 2?

We have begun our term continuing with our Term One study on 'The Power of Water, Ko te wai te ora ngā mea katoa'. Water is the life giver of all things. We are following through the students interest and inquiry

questions during class time while also making use of our classroom mascot, Triton the Shark, for home research.

Also this term we are keen to continue the study from our Papanui Catchment field trip. After learning to test the quality of water from three local waterways, we will use our knowledge and





equipment to continue testing water from more local streams and make comparisons.

This week our classroom is hosting a group of local teachers on a Middle School Roadie who will be coming to watch a lesson on our Localised Curriculum. We will be furthering our knowledge around the local legend of Awarua-o-Porirua and how this is depicted on our Waharoa.



Later in the term, our study will flow into whenua, the land. I am looking forward to finding out the Kea students inquiry questions which will lead this study. We will also be probing further into our local maunga which our school houses are named after.
