We have had a busy couple of weeks with some fantastic education outside the classroom. Our visit to Pukehou Marae last week was amazing. For many, it was their first experience of being welcomed onto a marae with powhiri, and the tama from Te Aute College certainly made it memorable. Their waiata was stirring with our students mesmerised by their power and harmony! Whakatangata kia kaha! Thank you to Whaea Liz, Whaea Kiri, and Matua Rākai.

For myself and Rachael (Mrs. Strong), who organised the day, it was both challenging and humbling. Personally, it was an honour to deliver the whaikorero and I know Rachael felt the same around singing the karanga as we were welcomed on. I feel that showing our vulnerability and willingness as learners to step outside of our comfort zones is important for us to model as we often expect this of our students!

After the pōwhiri, students rotated through a number of activities and kēmu (games) such as poi toa, rakau, weaving harakeke, creating a porotiti, story telling, and making fry bread (which was delicious!!). It was great to see our students embrace all the opportunities across the day, soaking up the experience.

We had some fantastic parent and whānau support on the day at the pōwhiri and with running the activities. A huge thanks to our kuia, Marlene, who led the karanga with Rachael and also to Michaela, Sarah, Rachel, and Michelle who helped run activities. We can't wait to return.





Do you want to encourage your children to live with a care for the earth?

Visit the CHB museum in Waipawa and experience this exhibition. A culmination of education, creativity and community sharing awareness and love of the earth and the environment.

This is an exhibition of works that has been brought together to remind us of the beauty of nature, and to show us what we face losing. It was formed around the idea of connecting people who care for the environment, as well as providing a space for people and the public to learn about various things going on in the world right now. Over fifty local artists are featured, with works in a variety of mediums and formats, and there are numerous educational resources onsite as well. Rather than charge commission, artists can choose to donate as much as they want to various charities, and the public can vote on how those donations are distributed amongst those charities. On the opening night we raised over \$650 in donations.

The title of the exhibition is inspired by Jan Speeden's piece "The Too Hard Basket", which was created as a way to express the anxiety and frustration felt at the slow and reluctant progress being made to mitigate the effects of climate change. This seemed a perfect way to capture the essence of this exhibition, to express the complexity of our situation, and our collective reluctance to acknowledge or address what is happening in the world right now, and so "Unpacking the Too Hard Basket" was born.

The CHB Museum is open 7 days a week, 10am to 4pm, with free entry, and the exhibition runs until May 30th.
